This issue contains some wee tips on Etiquette so please take note.

Tip 1 Fourth in hand opener. Rule of 15 is: High Card Points and number of spades equals 15. Normally this is better than other opening positions. If you have 10-11 High Card Points....YOU CAN PASS.

Tip 2 WHEN IN ANY DOUBT CALL OUR ESTEEMED DIRECTOR

Tip 3 Please do not tell your opponents what they should have bid unless invited to by them.

Tip 4 Please do not discuss the previous hand with your partner when you move to the next table, wait until after the session and discuss all boards then.

Tip 5 Dummy must remain silent, even if they notice a revoke by the opposition. It must be the declarer who brings it to the attention of the declarer. If dummy does speak then the Director will penalise them.



What is the best line of play?

If spades are divided 4-3, then you will have no problem making 3NT. If, however, spades are 5-2 then you could potentially lose 4 spade tricks and the KD if it is in the East hand.

The best way to play the hand is to duck the first trick. Let East win the JS. Then win the second or third trick, depending on West's action, and running the QD. When it loses, East will have no more spades to lead to his partner and your contract is safe.
