Protecting our Community

This is the perfect storm no one would wish for and yet here we are. Community viruses along with other winter ailments and rubbish weather, sadly but understandably, is impacting the Club significantly.

We continue to provide the opportunity for you to meet at the Club with several face-to-face Bridge sessions a week, and encourage you to practice all of the precautionary measures for your own good health, and others around you.

So, respectfully, we remind you:

Face Masks

Wearing face masks protects yourself and others from Covid-19 especially when it is not practical to physically distance from others, like with Face to Face Bridge play.

Testing and Isolating

If you feel unwell, have symptoms, or are a household contact of someone with Covid-19 please stay home and get tested immediately. Remember that RAT results do not always show positive in the first few days. Please stay at home until you are clear to return to the Club.

Vaccinations

Covid-19 vaccinations provide very good protection against developing severe disease. If you've had Covid-19, you will need to wait 3 months before vaccination and booster shots are available after 3 months of the primary infection. Your first booster may not be sufficient for what is circulating in the community right now. A second booster is available now - please consult with your medical practitioner for advice if you are unsure.






Wow!

Bridge Across The Ditch

12th July 2022

Covid and its ongoing aftermath have had a profound effect on our lives, not least on our favourite pastime. But there have been positives. One of these has been the development of the outstanding new online platform RealBridge, developed in Cambridge in the UK as a response to the widespread curtailment of face-to-face bridge. Many now see RealBridge as the go-to venue for the online game. While I am sure that we would all welcome a return to the good old days, it is certain that RealBridge is here to stay, and that it has opened up many new possibilities. One of these materialised on Tuesday 12 July, when no fewer than 248 players took part in a match between the Auckland Bridge Club and Sydney's North Shore Bridge Club. This was the culmination of much hard work between Auckland's Sylvester Riddell and North Shore's Gary Barwick, who must be congratulated in this hugely successful and enjoyable venture. It looks as though this will become a regular fixture, and it is likely to serve as a model for similar future events.

The Auckland Club asked me to provide a report on the event, so I coerced my mentor Biritch, the Russian Blue, into watching the session with me as it unfolded. Biritch is not a great fan of online bridge, but even he grudgingly admitted that this was an occasion that was most unlikely to occur live. The event comprised 30 boards with cross-IMP scoring, with pairs from each club playing alternate rounds as NS or EW to even out any bias. The large field was split into two, with 62 pairs in the Open section, and the same number in a Rookie/Junior/Inter-mediate section.

The Auckland team was extensively supplemented by players from all over the country. Several pairs obligingly switched allegiance (temporarily, one assumes) to equalise numbers on the two sides. The hands featured an unusually large number of slams, 7 in all including 3 grands; my search for some statistics suggested that this is a fewer than 1 in 100 occurrence.

Of course, not all of these were really biddable, but several pairs found the majority of them.

Kieran is a highly successful Australian player who moved to London. He has played as a professional for over 20 years.



There is a widely promoted theory that hands which meet what is called 'The Rule of 20' can be opened at the 1 level.

In this case North has 10 points in high cards and has a 7 card club suit plus a 3

card spade suit. 10 + 7 + 3 = 20.

So should North open 🐥 ?

I don't believe so and I don't disagree with the rule of 20 as a general guideline.

Just because you can open at the 1 level doesn't mean you must do so. This hand seems even more appropriate for a 3 opening. Yes the hand is worth about 10 points. The lovely club suit is worth about 7 and a half points and the two major suit cards are worth about 2 and a half points.

There were 13 tables today. What did they choose to open?

7 tables pre-empted 3 ♣

3 tables opened 1♣

3 tables passed as dealer

In my opinion 3 is a much better bid than 1, but I would much rather bid 1 than pass. Just because you are not sure which opening is better do not pass instead. Bridge is a bidder's game. You seldom see players go to collect a prize after a tournament and say to yourself "they are a solid conservative bidder." There is a piece of nonsense poetry.
